A Christmas Journey

The celebration of the holiday Thanksgiving has past and now the wonderful holiday of Christmas Season of all is about upon us. Which is also part of our childhood as we as parents and grandparents have or will give our children. We

also celebrated with our family and friends and neighbor's by sending out Christmas cards.

When I attended my locale church on the last Sunday in November the music director gave the announcement who ever wished to join choir or for going out caroling for Christmas song signing please see him right after service for sign up and practice dates and time. I then watched the choir members assemble in front of the congregation while the music director rifled through papers on the slim black stand. The music began, and the singers launched into a well-known song that started with these words: "Come, now is the time to worship". I smiled at the appropriate choice of music. And began remembering earlier that week I had been reading Luke's account of Jesus' birth. Then I thought back when I was traveling through Pennsylvania, State remembering the town's given names of Nazareth and Bethlehem it was about 9 miles between them and take about 10 minutes by car.

But if you're in Nazareth of Galilee, Israel and you're traveling along with your pregnant wife by foot and donkey as Joseph did, it's about 80 miles to Bethlehem. That journey probably took Joseph and Mary about a week with food & water and they didn't stay in a nice hotel when they got there. All Joseph could find was a stall in the stable, and that's where Mary delivered "her first born Son" (Luke 2:7).

But the journey for the infant Jesus was much farther than 80 miles. He left his place in heaven at God's right hand, came to earth, and accepted our humanity. After

the angel announced Jesus birth to some wide-eyed shepherds, a chorus of angels began “praising God and saying: ‘Glory to God in the highest!’” (Luke 2:13-14). The shepherds responded by running to Bethlehem where they found the newborn King lying in a barnyard makeshift bassinet. They returned to their field “glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen” (v.20). Coming face to face with the Son inspired the shepherds to worship God the Father.

Today consider your response to Jesus arrival on earth. I there room for worship in your heart to celebrate His birth. Note; that the first Christmas lacked our modern-day parties, gifts, and feasting – but it did include worship.

TOP TEN HOLIDAY SHOPPING SAFETY TIPS

It is that time of year for Christmas shopping. And the bad guys and gals know it too. They salivate over women with kids and seniors in shopping centers parking lots with goodies, kids and money. Who become very easy targets?

Thousands of robberies happen this time of year, and a lot them never get solved. But the economy been very bad this year has increased two fold as well with the assaults robberies go up. The good kind citizens are traumatized because of no work and are now going way of crime to help their situation.

Try to picture this. A mom with her kids or a senior coming out of the stores on the way to the car. The parking lot isn't all that

well lit. Maybe pushing a cart or trying to carry bags, or on the cell phone and distracted for some reason? And they would be criminal (s) can come up from behind and rip away the purse, or knock you down and take your wallet. With Christmas just around the corner the big malls are gearing up. Are you ready? Just a few safety tips help you and your family is safe.

1. Shop-during the day and avoid night trips.
2. Shopping with a friend or family member can lessen your chance of being attacked.
3. Be aware of your surroundings common sense-usually prevails, and walk confidently to your car with yours keys out, they can also be used as weapons when attacked.
4. Park in well-lit areas and always make sure to lock your car. Once inside your car make sure the doors are locked and be wary.
5. Condense your packages to create the illusion you did not purchase as much.
6. Carry your purse close to your body. Keep wallets in front pockets or inside coat.
7. Try to shop when mall is less crowded. Between 0900-1200 best.
8. Teach your children what to do in the event they are lost. Advise them to look for a security guard or a sales counter and see the sales clerk for help.
9. If you have gifts in your car cover them up with a blanket, or place them in the trunk. Out of sight is out of mind which leaves no temptations.

10. If you get attacked make as much noise as you can scream, use your car alarm, use the panic button your key fob-all to draw attention to your predicament.

Perhaps the best tip you can get is pay attention, do not be distracted when ever shopping and you will not become a victim. Please make this holiday a memorable one.

NOTARY PUBLIC

The following Post members are commissioned as Notary Public's for the Commonwealth of Virginia:

- Service Officer, Gunnar Gudjonsson
- Chaplain, Bob Duvall

They are authorized to legally

notarize documents such as Power of Attorney, Bill of Sale, Will, Living Will, etc. Please check with the VFW main office for appointment.

Be aware that under the VA code the notary must acknowledge:

- (1) Signer must personally appear before the notary.
- (2) Signer (s) must positively be identified
- (3) Signer must affirm under oath the accuracy of the document.

Acceptable Forms of Identification:

(To be acceptable, the ID must be current, contain a photo and physical description of the card holder, have the card holder's signature, and a serial or ID number.)

- (1) Driver's license or State issued ID card.
- (2) U.S. Passport
- (3) Foreign Passport, validated by INS.
- (4) Driver's license issued in Mexico or Canada
- (5) U.S. Military ID Card.

We do not rely on Social Security cards, credit cards, or a photo ID card issued by non government entities. Under the law the notary has the right to refuse, if he/she suspects something may be false or wrong.

SAFETY TIPS

Written by a Cop for your own safety!

Everyone should take 5 minutes to read this. It may save your life or a loved one's life. In daylight hours, refresh yourself of these things to do in an emergency situation... This is for you, and for you to share with your wife, your children, & everyone you know.

It never hurts to be careful in this crazy world we live in.

1. Tip from Tae Kwon Do : The elbow is the strongest point on your body. If you are close enough to use it, do!

2. If a robber asks for your wallet and/or purse, **DO NOT HAND IT TO HIM.** Toss it away from you....Chances are that he is more interested in your wallet and/or purse than you, and he will go for the wallet/purse. **RUN LIKE MAD IN THE OTHER DIRECTION!**

3. If you are ever thrown into the trunk of a car, kick out the back tail lights and stick your arm out the hole and start waving like crazy. The driver won't see you, but everybody else will. This has saved lives.

4. Women have a tendency to get into their cars after shopping, eating, working, etc., and just sit (doing their checkbook, or making a list, etc. **DON'T DO THIS!**) The predator will be watching you, and this is the perfect opportunity for him to get in on the passenger side, put a gun to your head, and tell you where to go. **AS SOON AS YOU GET INTO YOUR CAR , LOCK THE DOORS AND LEAVE.**

5. If someone is in the car with a gun to your head **DO NOT DRIVE OFF!** Instead gun the engine and speed into anything, wrecking the car. Your Air Bag will save you. If the person is in the back seat they will get the worst of it. As soon as the car crashes bail out and run. It is better than having them find your body in a remote location.

6. A few notes about getting into your car in a parking lot, or parking garage: A.) Be aware: look around you, look into your car, at the passenger side floor , and in the back seat. B.) If you are parked next to a big van, enter your car from the

passenger door. Most serial killers attack their victims by pulling them into their vans while the women are attempting to get into their cars. C.) Look at the car parked on the driver's side of your vehicle, and the passenger side. If a male is sitting alone in the seat nearest your car, you may want to walk back into the mall, or work, and get a guard/policeman to walk you back out. **IT IS ALWAYS BETTER TO BE SAFE THAN SORRY.** (And better paranoid than dead.)

7. **ALWAYS** take the elevator instead of the stairs. Stairwells are horrible places to be alone and the perfect crime spot. This is especially true at **NIGHT!**)

8. If the predator has a gun and you are not under his control, **ALWAYS RUN!** The predator will only hit you (a running target) 4 in 100 times; and even then, it most likely **WILL NOT** be a vital organ. **RUN,** Preferably in a zig-zag pattern!

9. As women, we are always trying to be sympathetic: **STOP** It may get you raped, or killed. Ted Bundy, the serial killer, was a good-looking, well educated man, who **ALWAYS** played on the sympathies of unsuspecting women. He walked with a cane, or a limp, and often asked 'for help' into his vehicle or with his vehicle, which is when he abducted his next victim.

10. Another Safety Point: Someone just told me that her friend heard a crying baby on her porch the night before last, and she called the police because it was late and she thought it was weird.. The police told her 'Whatever you do, **DO NOT** open the door.' The lady then said that it sounded like the baby had crawled near a window, and she was worried that it would crawl to

the street and get run over. The policeman said, 'We already have a unit on the way, whatever you do, **DO NOT** open the door.' He told her that they think a serial killer has a baby's cry recorded and uses it to coax women out of their homes thinking that someone dropped off a baby.. He said they have not verified it, but have had several calls by women saying that they hear baby's cries outside their doors when they're home alone at night.

11. Water scam! If you wake up in the middle of the night to hear all your taps outside running or what you think is a burst pipe, **DO NOT GO OUT TO INVESTIGATE!** These people turn on all your outside taps full blast so that you will go out to investigate and then attack.
